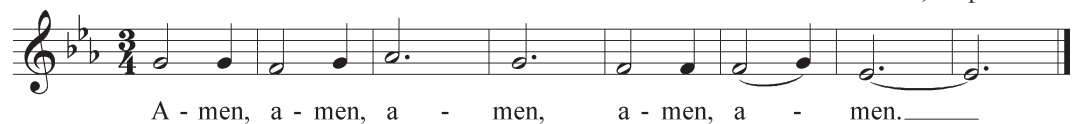

Mary is the Mother of Jesus, the very source of life. October is especially dedicated to Mary as Our Lady of the Rosary. It's the perfect time to learn—or relearn—the rosary.

Prayer for Life

Pope John Paul II's encyclical Evangelium Vitae concludes with this amazing prayer to Mary, Mother of the living.

O Mary, bright dawn of the new world,
Mother of the living,
to you do we entrust the cause of life
Look down, O Mother,
upon the vast numbers
of babies not allowed to be born,
of the poor whose lives are made difficult,
of men and women
who are victims of brutal violence,
of the elderly and the sick killed
by indifference or out of misguided mercy.
Grant that all who believe in your Son
may proclaim the Gospel of life

Praying the Rosary

The rosary has been called a “compendium of the Gospel” (Pope John Paul II). It is one of the most beloved prayers of the Church. Praying the Rosary is simple. It is really a practice of meditation on “mysteries,” key moments in the lives of Jesus and Mary in the Gospels.

Introductory Prayers. Start with the Sign of the Cross. Recite the Creed. Then, on the first four beads of the rosary, recite the Our Father, Three Hail Marys, and the Glory be to the Father.

Announce the Mystery. Take a moment to reflect on the mystery you are praying, letting the scene come to life in your imagination. When you are ready, begin the prayers of the decade: one Our Father, ten Hail Marys, and concluding with a Glory be to the Father. Five mysteries make a complete rosary. If you don't have time to do all five, you might space them out through the day, whenever you can catch a few minutes for prayer. It's traditional to pray different mysteries each day of the week: the Glorious Mysteries on Sundays and Wednesdays, the Joyful Mysteries on Mondays and Saturdays, the Sorrowful Mysteries on Tuesdays and Fridays, and the Luminous Mysteries on Thursdays.

Concluding Prayers of the Rosary. It's traditional to conclude the rosary with the “Hail, Holy Queen,” and the following prayer attributed to Leo XIII:

O God, whose only begotten Son,
by his life, death, and Resurrection,
has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life,
grant, we beseech you,
that, meditating upon these mysteries
of the most holy rosary
of the Blessed Virgin Mary,
we may imitate what they contain
and obtain what they promise.
Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
