# ST. JAMES CATHEDRAL

Dear Friends,

Back in 1981, my predecessor as pastor, Father William Gallagher, had the wisdom and enlightened good sense to hire Dr. James Savage as the Cathedral's music director. His decision turned out to be a profoundly important one. We are still experiencing its effects today.

When Jim arrived here, the Cathedral was, in many respects, a far different place than it is today. It looked very different (on the inside!), and the parish that gathered here was very different: only about a third of the size it now is and made up mostly of people living in the neighborhood. Children were hard to find. One of the only constants throughout those 30 years has been Jim Savage himself!

Thirty years is a long time. It's nearly a third of the Cathedral's history. It's also time enough to create a legacy, and Jim has surely done that. Thanks to his leadership, the music program of St. James Cathedral has come to be recognized throughout this country as both superior and superb. And when I say that I include the entire music program, all of it world class: the organists, the Cathedral Choir of St. James, the Women of St. James Schola, the Cathedral Cantorei, the Cathedral Chamber Orchestra, and the Cathedral's three children's choirs (Schola Cantorum, St. Gregory Choir, St. Cecilia Singers). When Jim arrived on the scene, there was an organist and a rather small choir -- a music program at a fairly low ebb even though there had been some high points in its history.

But it's not just the music program that has changed over these years. The Cathedral building itself has changed and Jim played an important role in all those changes, serving as my trusted advisor on nearly every artistic and liturgical judgment that was made during the great renovation and restoration of 1994. In the Catholic Church, liturgy and music and the arts are not separate entities: they are intricately and inseparably woven together in the great fabric that is Catholic worship. With his considerable gifts, Jim was very instrumental in making sure that each of those essential elements played its proper part in that great undertaking.

Thirty years is a long time, but the mere passage of time is no guarantee of progress, growth, or success. In Jim's case, however, 30 years has meant the growth of something truly wonderful and the blossoming of something beyond beautiful. Sunday after Sunday when we come together, each of us is a part of that beautiful something as we sing together the praises of our God in our magnificent Cathedral. And as we do -- and especially so on Jim's thirtieth anniversary weekend -- I hope we will stop to give thanks to God for sending Jim Savage to St. James, thanks, too, to Jim for using his amazing gifts to help St. James become the wonderful praying, singing, and serving community it is!

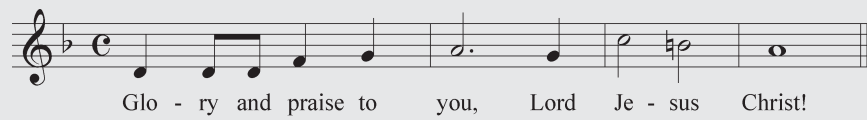

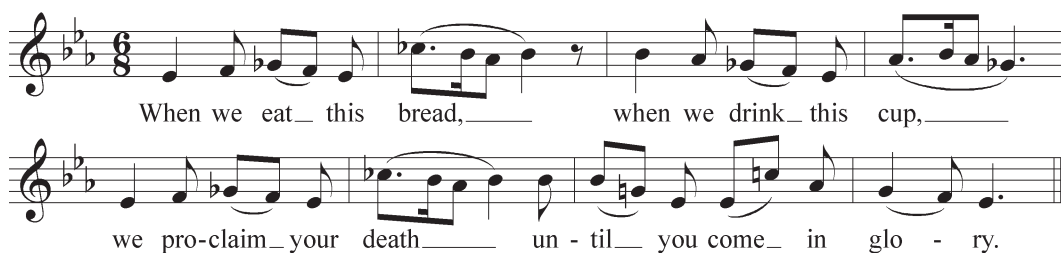


