



CAMINO SEATTLE

Camino Seattle is a five-week walking/hiking and prayer event for St. James Cathedral Parish, beginning June 24, 2012 and ending July 29, 2012, the Feast of St. James.

FIRST STAGE OF THE CAMINO: St. Jean Pied-de-Port

St. Jean Pied-de-Port marks the beginning of the Camino de Santiago, sometimes called the Camino Francés because it was here that several pilgrim paths from across France and other parts of Europe joined. St. Jean Pied-de-Port ("Saint John at the foot of the crossing") is the last stop before crossing the border into Spain and reaching Roncesvalles, the Spanish town famously associated with Charlemagne and the *Song of Roland*. This is one of the most difficult parts of the Camino. In the words of a 12th-century pilgrim guidebook, "there is on the road of St. James a very high mountain. Its ascent is eight miles long, and its descent, equally eight. In fact, its height is such that it seems to touch the sky: to him who climbs it, it seems as if he was able to touch the sky with his hand."

Reflection: Starting Off

People undertake the Camino for many different reasons—to pray, to be alone, to be with friends, to test their endurance, to take in the scenery, the beauty, the history, and, above, all, to be transformed. Pilgrims must leave something behind, and while they have a destination in mind, the journey itself, not just the arrival, is holy.

Jesus used many images to describe the Kingdom of God – meals and banquets, landlords, fathers and sons, seeds and harvests – and journeys. "Follow me." "Take up your cross and come after me." "I am the way, the truth, and the life." "Enter through the narrow gate." The early Church embraced this image of the journey: before we were called Christians, we were called followers of "the Way."

As you set off on this Camino Seattle, you might take some time to reflect on questions that every pilgrim must answer. Where do you want to get to? What path will you choose? What do you fear to leave behind?

Advice for Pilgrims

"Someone goes legitimately to Saint James' threshold if he forgives those who have injured him before he begins his journey; if he accepts penance from all; if he speaks not idle words but saintly stories; if he hears Mass, if not every day then at least on Sundays and feast days; if he prays without interruption; if he tolerates all adversities patiently; if after he returns, he perseveres in good works up until the end." (*from a 12th-century sermon on the Feast of St. James*)
