Immortal Love

Poets of the Spiritual Life



Wednesdays, October 8, October 22, November 5, and November 19
7:00pm-8:30pm | St. James Cathedral, Rectory Parlors

This series will explore the spirituality of four Christian poets from the Victorian period: CHRISTINA ROSSETTI, FRANCIS THOMPSON, ALFRED, LORD TENNYSON, and GERARD MANLEY HOPKINS. **Corinna Laughlin** (Cathedral liturgy director and PhD in English Literature) will offer an overview of the poet and a close look at a few key poems, read by Cathedral reader **Scott Webster**. All are welcome!

October 8 | Christina Rossetti (1830-1894)

Christina Rossetti is perhaps best known today for her Christmas lyric "In the bleak midwinter." She was one of the finest poets of the Victorian period, and among her most compelling works are those exploring Christian themes.

October 22 (**NOTE DATE CHANGE!**) | Francis Thompson (1859-1907)

Francis Thompson was born into a prominent Catholic family, but spent his youth on the streets. We will explore Thompson's greatest poem, *The Hound of Heaven*, one of the classics of Catholic poetry in English.

November 5 | Alfred, Lord Tennyson (1809-1892)

The defining event of Tennyson's life was the death of his best friend Arthur Hallam in 1833. During this time when we remember our dead, we will read selections from Tennyson's *In Memoriam*.

November 19 | Gerard Manley Hopkins (1844-1889)

One of the greatest poets in the English language, Gerard Manley Hopkins was also a Catholic convert and Jesuit priest. We will explore some of his shorter poems which touch on the dark and light of his life and relationship with God.

A booklet with the poems to be read and discussed is free in the Cathedral Bookstore if you would like to prepare in advance. Copies will be available at each session as well.



Initiative 594:

A Catholic Perspective

Initiative 594 is an important issue on the ballot this fall. I-594 calls for background checks for all purchases of firearms. At present, only purchases from licensed dealers require background checks, and I-594 would close the so-called “gun show loophole.” What is our church saying about I-594?

From the Bishops of Washington State:

We support Initiative 594, which places some limits on gun sales. As a consistent voice for reducing violence, the Catholic Church has been a strong advocate for the reasonable regulation of firearms. ...

The purpose of Initiative 594 is to require a background check on the sale or transfer of all firearms other than antique firearms, for both licensed and unlicensed purchasers. We bishops have supported these provisions in the past and now support this initiative's reasonable inclusion of background checks for online sales and sales at gun shows. ...

We support:

1. Measures that place reasonable conditions on the sale and use of firearms
2. Measures that make guns safer
3. Sensible regulation of handguns
4. Efforts intended to curb easy access to deadly weapons, including assault rifles
5. A serious commitment to confront the pervasive role of addiction and mental illness in crime

Our hope is that judicious steps to prevent gun violence will lead to greater respect for human life. We urge Catholics and all people of good will to seek consensus on initiatives that promote public safety while respecting our constitutional guarantees for personal liberty.

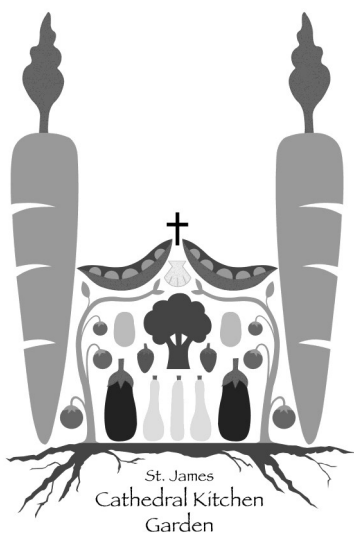
CATHEDRAL KITCHEN GARDEN
