DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

April 3, 2016

The “Divine Mercy” devotions, which have spread worldwide, began with a series of apparitions of Christ to a Polish nun, Faustina Kowalska (1905-1938). Christ appeared to St. Faustina on February 22, 1931. In her diary, later published under the title *Divine Mercy in My Soul*, the saint wrote: “I saw Jesus dressed in a white garment. He held one hand in blessing and the other hand was touching his garment at the breast. From under the garment came two rays of light, one red the other pale.” From this vision came the image of the Divine Mercy. The words of Christ to St. Faustina have formed the basis for the Divine Mercy devotions, which are a call to trust in the love and mercy of Christ, and to show mercy towards others, by faithfully carrying out the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. The devotion takes many forms, especially the chaplet—a sequence of prayers offered on regular rosary beads—and the novena, which concludes on the Sunday after Easter.

The devotion which began in an obscure Polish convent has since spread all over the world. It was briefly



suppressed in 1959, but received official Vatican sanction on April 15, 1978. Pope John Paul II, who had a great devotion to Christ under the title of the Divine Mercy, declared the Second Sunday of Easter “Divine Mercy Sunday” for the entire Church.

When John Paul II consecrated the Shrine of the Divine Mercy in Krakow in 2002, he offered this prayer:

*God, merciful Father,
in your Son, Jesus Christ, you have
revealed your love
and poured it out upon us in the Holy
Spirit, the Comforter,
We entrust to you today the destiny
of the world and of every man and
woman.
Bend down to us sinners,
heal our weakness,
conquer all evil,
and grant that all the peoples
of the earth
may experience your mercy.*

*In You, the Triune God,
may they ever find the source of hope.
Eternal Father,
by the Passion and Resurrection of your Son,
have mercy on us and upon the whole world! Amen.*

The Chaplet of Divine Mercy

The Chaplet is recited using ordinary rosary beads of five decades.

Introductory Prayers—

- ◆ Our Father
- ◆ Hail Mary
- ◆ The Apostle's Creed

Leader: I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

ALL: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

On the large bead before each decade:

Leader: Eternal Father,
I offer you the Body and Blood,
Soul and Divinity,
of Your Dearly Beloved Son,
Our Lord, Jesus Christ,
ALL: in atonement for our sins
and those of the whole world.

On the ten small beads of each decade:

Leader: For the sake of His sorrowful Passion,
ALL: have mercy on us and on the whole world.

At the conclusion of the chaplet, the following is said three times:

Leader: Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One,
ALL: have mercy on us and on the whole world.

THE WORKS OF MERCY

In the coming weeks, as part of the Year of Mercy, we will explore the Corporal Works of Mercy in a series of essays by Cathedral parishioner Lisa Casterella. The traditional Corporal Works of Mercy are: to feed the hungry; to give drink to the thirsty; to clothe the naked; to harbour the harbourless; to visit the sick; to ransom the captive; to bury the dead. What are some of the ways we are living out these works of mercy at St. James Cathedral?



TO FEED THE HUNGRY

The St. Martin de Porres Sandwich Ministry is described by Outreach Minister Tom Frasene as “one of the many, quiet, beautiful things that goes on at St James...we make a huge difference in the lives of the people we serve.” This ministry provides 240 to 270 homeless men an evening meal every 2nd and 4th Monday. Approximately 100 parishioners and other volunteers drop off sandwiches, hard-boiled eggs, homemade cookies plus donated soup (from Food Lifeline) to the Cathedral Hall after Mass on Sundays or to the Parish Office on Mondays to be distributed later in the day.

St. Martin de Porres Shelter is housed in a former Coast Guard induction center. Homeless men over the age of 50 are given a meal and a safe, warm place to sleep. There are also laundry facilities, restrooms and a chapel. The kitchen is not large enough to prepare meals for such a big group so sandwich ministries from Seattle area churches are vital. There are overnight facilities for 212. Tim, a parishioner and father of three, finds this ministry to be



very rewarding. His family prepares sandwiches one or two Sunday nights per month. Tim is also one of the drivers responsible for transporting the parish accumulation of food to the shelter on Monday afternoons. “It’s a good example to my kids of how we can help people in need,” Tim says. The Sandwich Ministry helps answer a prayer we often hear at Mass: “May the homeless of our city find a hot meal and a warm place to sleep tonight.”

The pilgrimage will occur between July 22–August 2, 2016. The goals of World Youth Day are: (1) A moving and sanctifying pilgrimage in faith. (2) An experience of the power of the Holy Spirit to strengthen the faith of our young people. (3) Rediscover the centrality of the Word and Sacrament. (4) Enable pilgrims to be witnesses to Christ. (5) Provide an encounter with Jesus Christ, His Spirit, and His Church.

Krakow, Poland offers a powerhouse of pilgrimage sites and saints, such as St. Maximilian Kolbe, St. Faustina, and Pope John Paul II. This particular World Youth Day is the 30th anniversary of this extraordinary global event and will focus on Divine Mercy.
