

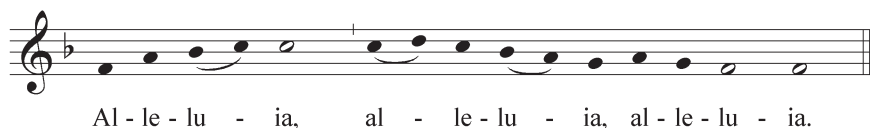



South Sudan Refugee Crisis

Tens of thousands of people have fled South Sudan to neighboring countries this summer, in response to a surge in ethnically charged violence in the war-torn country. The civil conflict, which began in 2013, has resulted in the deaths of more than 10,000 people and displacement of more than 2 million others. More than 835,000 have fled the country.



2 million displaced

8,000 refugees arrive in Uganda in one day

75% of recent refugees are children

10,000 refugees at the Elegu center, ten times its 1,000-person capacity

Since early July, at least 37,890 refugees have arrived in Uganda, more than in the entire first half of 2016 alone. More than 8,000 new arrivals were reported on July 21 — a one-day record for the year. The number of South Sudanese refugees in East Africa could top 1 million this year. Nearly three-quarters of those who have fled in recent weeks are children, a majority of whom arrive malnourished after making the long journey with little food. Some refugees at the Elegu collection point on the South Sudan-Uganda border said they had only received biscuits from humanitarian agencies. On July 22 there were more than 10,000 refugees at the center, ten times its 1,000-person capacity.

Some women and children arriving in Uganda said they had been separated from their husbands and fathers by armed groups, who are reportedly forcibly recruiting men and barring them from leaving the country.



Catholic Relief Services carries out the commitment of the Bishops of the United States to assist the poor and vulnerable overseas.

Catholic Relief Services in South Sudan

Right now, a record 5.8 million people in South Sudan are facing a severe hunger crisis. A persistent El Nino-driven climate pattern has caused drought so severe, nearly half of the country's population are unsure where their next meal will come from. CRS currently implements emergency relief and long-term development programs, as well as water and sanitation improvements that keep the water supply safe and flowing. Have you drifted away from your Catholic faith? Are you disillusioned by what you hear about your Church? Do you desire a life filled with faith?

St. James Cathedral offers a 10-week “Welcome Back” program for Catholics out of touch with a Church that once may have been home. It’s a safe place to ask questions, learn about changes in the Church, and begin to experience a small community of faith.
