Dear Friends,

Ever since that world-changing event, Christmas has been not only a moment in the far-distant past, but an event in the present and a constantly unfolding mystery. What happened in a lowly stable in Bethlehem two-thousand years ago happens over and over again in our time as we open our lives, our hearts, and our homes to the God who actually takes delight in dwelling among us.

May you and all your loved ones be touched by the great Mystery we celebrate this day and, if you happen to be among those who find yourself wondering whether or not you belong here, let me assure you that you do, and that you are most welcome!

May the peace, abiding love, and overflowing joy that are Christmas be yours in abundance.


