From the Pastor's Desk | April 5, 2026

Dear Friends,
Happy Easter! Today we gather to celebrate the new life given us in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Our song today and throughout this Easter Season is ALLELUIA! This word that we have fasted from all throughout Lent means "Praise God!" And certainly we do that today as we gather to celebrate Jesus' victory over death.

We praise God for the Elect of our Church who were baptized at the Easter Vigil and for the renewal of our own life in Christ that was born in the waters of baptism. Our Lenten journey has led to this, has prepared us for this renewal and rebirth. During this time of preparation we have been invited to die to self and to live more and more for Christ and for others. As individuals and as a people of faith, it is that pattern of dying and rising that gives meaning to our lives and is the foundation of our faith. Today, as we gather to celebrate Easter, we are renewed in the new life that bursts forth from the tomb of Jesus.

In our parish and throughout the Catholic Church in Western Washington, we are engaged in another pattern of dying and rising called *Partners in the Gospel*. This strategic pastoral planning process is a call for our whole Church to be renewed in our mission to share the Good News that we celebrate today. And this process also involves a dying and rising in our life as individual parishes. We are becoming a new parish – the parish of St. James, rooted in three locations: First Hill (the Cathedral), Downtown (Christ Our Hope), and the Central District (Immaculate Conception).

In that becoming, we are leaving something behind. We are dying, as it were, to what was in our individual and separate parishes. This is not easy. We fear losing what is essential to who we are. Such fear does not mean we lack faith. Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane is our model of facing fear and relying on God's strength to see us through. For just as Jesus left that garden and faced his greatest fear as he dies, seemingly alone on the cross, God has the final say.

Jesus' trust, even in the midst of his fear, opens him to the new life that God the Father has in store for him. The new life of the

Resurrection which we celebrate this day and for the next fifty days of Easter, affirms that God is with us inviting us into new and deeper life with him. So while it is natural for us, as we come together as a new parish, to fear losing that which is essential to the identity of each of our three parishes, today's great feast reminds us that God will bring what is essential into the newness to which we are being called.

In the coming weeks we will hear in the Gospel accounts stories of the Risen Christ encountering his disciples. Often they don't recognize him at first. There is something brand new about his body. He now lives a new life, a life transformed by his victory over death. But then there is something about his words or actions – and they realize that it really is him and that he brings with him all that they shared while he was with them.

My friends, that is the pattern of our own lives as we move deeper and deeper into relationship with God through the little deaths we experience in this life. If we are willing to give ourselves over more and more to these deaths – whether it is the actual physical death we face, or the death of someone we love, or the death-like experiences of the loss of a relationship, of our health, or of a move to an unfamiliar place, or any other kind of human experience that feels like death and loss, God wants to give us new life out of these dying experiences. God also wants to reassure us that in this necessary pattern of life, death and resurrection we are never alone and we never lose what is essential of who we are in relationship to our loving God.

It is that pattern that is also at the heart of *Partners in the Gospel* and our coming together as one new parish. In the coming months may the Risen Lord strengthen us for the dying that this process necessarily involves, and prepare us for the new life that will burst forth in our parish just as surely as it burst forth that first Easter morning. Alleluia!

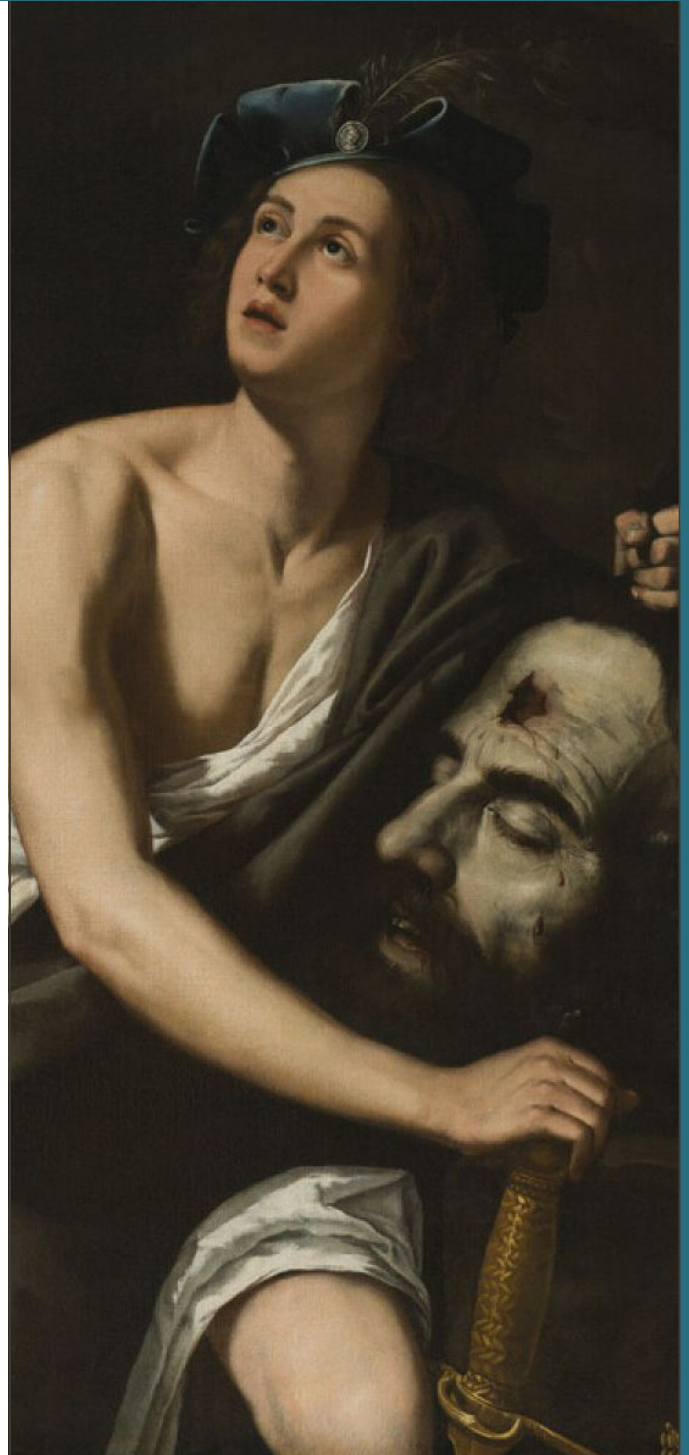

ST. JAMES CATHEDRAL

804 9th Avenue, Seattle

The Cathedral Church for the Catholic Archdiocese of Seattle, St. James is also a large and vibrant parish. Noted for its beautiful liturgies and its extensive outreach to the poor, the Cathedral also serves the city of Seattle as an important gathering place, a crossroads for learning, and a center for the arts. Built in 1907, St. James Cathedral is an impressive Italian Renaissance-style building. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, the first American citizen to be canonized, worshiped in the Cathedral in its early years. In 1994, a nationally acclaimed restoration and renovation completely renewed the beauty of this beloved Seattle landmark.

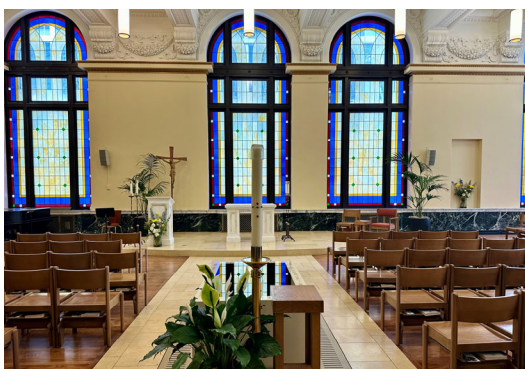

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

820 18th Avenue, Seattle

Immaculate Conception is the oldest Catholic Church in the city of Seattle. The parish shares an anniversary with nearby Seattle University: both institutions trace their founding to 1891. By the 1960s, Immaculate Conception was an incredibly diverse community and a hub for civil rights. Today, Immaculate Conception is a small but tight-knit community that treasures its history, its church building, and its cultural traditions, and continues to have a strong conscience for social justice. In 2020, Immaculate is where Catholics came to mourn and to protest following the murder of George Floyd. Parishioners and leaders were instrumental in forming a deanery-wide Racial Solidarity group, in which St. James Cathedral and Christ Our

CHRIST OUR HOPE

1902 2nd Avenue, Seattle

Christ Our Hope was established on October 28, 2009 by Archbishop Alexander J. Brunett as a “personal parish”—that is, a parish without boundaries. Father Paul Magnano was the founding pastor. The name of the parish was inspired by the 2008 visit of Pope Benedict XVI to the United States, which had for its theme “Christ, our Hope.” The church is housed in the Josephinum, the largest low-income housing property owned and operated by Catholic Community Services, with 221 studio and one-bedroom apartments—80% of which are set aside for formerly homeless people. Part of the vision of Christ Our Hope has been to pray and serve in partnership with the Josephinum. As a downtown church just a block from the Pike Place Market, the parish welcomes visitors during tourist season, offering a warm and intimate experience of liturgy.
